13	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thank you. Our next item of
14	business is Consideration of Relicensure of Class B Licensees,
15	Resolution 24-054, and I'd like to invite Ameristar Casino
16	Kansas City GM Keith Henson and Julie Allen, Director of
17	Regulatory Compliance, to make the presentation. Welcome.
18	MR. HENSON: Thank you. Good morning. We were just up
19	here about two months ago for the Class A license, so a lot of
20	what we have to talk about is a little bit redundant so we'll
21	keep it succinct today.
22	I do have our colleagues and want to start by
23	introducing my colleagues. So again, Keith Henson, and I was
24	originally licensed in Missouri 18 years ago and I'm the
25	rookie of the group of my colleagues.

To my right is Julie Allen, who's our Director of Regulatory Compliance, and Julie is hitting her 30th year in Missouri of being licensed in our state.

Behind me is Shawn Ledbetter, our Director of Regulatory Compliance at Ameristar St. Charles of 25 years of being licensed.

And then my colleague, Doug Lang, our Senior Vice

President of Operations at St. Charles, oversees day-to-day

operations with over 21 years of experience here in Missouri

of which obviously we're very proud.

So I will get into Kansas City and our home dock of Port of KC. You know, we far exceed any of the expectations through charitable giving, through economic development, through our MBE and WBE expectations. And, you know, they're a partner of ours throughout. They're kind of a silent partner, considering where we're located, but yet we continue to work very closely to ensure that we uphold all of our obligations with the original authority and the home dock requirement.

Our capital investments, and these are physical capital investments at the property level over the last year and then this previous year that we're in. This doesn't include all of the IT and technology, the slot machines. This really is what are we physically doing to the plant.

We've completely renovated our steakhouse, our

ballrooms, we converted an old buffet space to a ballroom to cater to that group and convention business. We renovated and rebranded one of our bars to a Stardust Bar as well as our cafe, we have a new cafe on property called Cafe Primo right inside the main entrance.

A good bit of our projects are infrastructure: escalators, elevators, which are a considerable investment within the property, as well as a hotel room remodel as it relates to carpet, FF&E, a lot of back-of-the-house items related to employee safety. I'll get into a little bit more of the safety protocols when we talk about our crime statistics as well.

But we have installed a weapons detection system so that all of our team members as well as our guests must go through a weapons detection system before they come on the casino floor or into the property as well as isolated employee parking to help protect our team members while they're on property.

Crime statistics are a good story for us. We continue to be tougher. There's a lot of press about how our overall environment after Covid became pretty tough, and our environment wasn't indifferent to that. We ensure that we follow very strict guidelines of who should be on the property and we remove those who shouldn't be.

When you look at our underage persons on the gaming

floor, we had three in all of 2023. You know, with over three million people coming onto the casino floor, I think that's a pretty remarkable statistic, and we use the latest technology to ensure that we are checking IDs, scanning IDs and ensuring that we don't allow any fraudulent IDs on the floor.

We have had our statistics in 2023 and continuing into 2024 down from the previous years, down in intoxicated, down in drugs, down in fraudulent IDs, and we do believe that that is both a testament to our team as well as to the testament of the technology that we've deployed.

Underage gaming is most important to us. We put every single team member through what we call *Are You 21 Training?*Where they go through extensive training to identify and to prevent underage from coming on the floor. We hold all of our team members accountable for being aware and asking for IDs just in case they get by that first pass of security. If that were to happen, our team members are also being trained on how to identify anybody underage.

Our charitable contributions is really -- we're well known for it. We give to various different community organizations from Children's Mercy Hospital to Wayside Waifs to Happy Bottoms. The list goes on and on. What we're most proud about is this usually comes from our team members.

We have a committee of team members on our property who come to us with organizations they want to support. We vet

those organizations, and that's where we spend both our time and our financial contributions; but also our volunteerism of our team members, we track as well.

Economic development through our gaming taxes, you know, \$52 million a year. That's both through the real estate, state, local, gaming taxes, and admission fees; and then on top of that, over \$27 million in compensation directly to our team members at Ameristar Kansas City. We have 620 total employees on property.

Our MBE and WBE, we have averaged about 27 percent total spent on Minority Business Enterprises and Women Business Enterprises. This graph changes as the years go on as certain organizations can go between the two, between minority and through women-owned businesses, so that's when you see the fluctuations. Most of the time, it's just where they end up on the column, and I know our colleagues will be a testament to us exceeding the expectations on this requirement.

And really, with that said, most of what we covered on the Class A would be redundant. So unless there's any questions, I'll pass it to Mr. Lang.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I do have a question. You mentioned -- you talked about MBE and WBE minority-owned businesses, but I do have a question about management diversity. I noticed in the information that was provided to

us that there was a comparison of both minority and women in management positions, and both of those are lower than the local population in Kansas City and just wondered if, you know, you had any processes or programs in place maybe to work on that.

MR. HENSON: Great question. You know, I know that our team member population exceeds the diversity matrix for the state of Kansas City. On our management team, we are definitely lower on minorities, and our women continue to get more and more.

We have a Women's Leadership Development Committee on our property. Actually, Julie is a leader in that. You know, our Director of Human Resources is a woman as well, as well as we have a Regional Vice President; and between the three of them, they're really focused on developing our women leadership within the organization.

I think that's one major initiative that we continue to work on. And then we also have team member resource groups that are about bringing minorities up through the ranks and showing them the way of how they can become leaders in our organization, so definitely a focus of ours. We're not there yet, but we continue to work on it.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I just wondered if you were working with any local groups, Chamber of Commerce or, you know, I know that there are leadership groups as well. Being

1	from Kansas City, I probably have an unfair advantage knowing
2	what's available to you all there and in connecting with folks
3	who might be able to help with that. It's hard to hire
4	anybody but, you know, obviously I know that you're focusing
5	on that.
6	MR. HENSON: Yeah. You know, I don't have any direct
7	examples of us working within the examples you gave us, but
8	would love to sit down and hear, you know, your perspective,
9	knowing how you've done it in Kansas City.
10	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Certainly.
11	MR. HENSON: You know, we're kind of in an island in
12	Kansas City a little bit.
13	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Yes.
14	MR. HENSON: And so we need to be able to get more
15	visibility in that area.
16	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: And I only had one other question
17	for you all. As far as the 2024 tax revenue, which is through
18	the end of July, does it appear that you're on track to meet
19	the increases that you've seen in the last three years?
20	MR. HENSON: I would say we're very steady. We
21	definitely don't see an increase in revenues. We are flat and
22	we've been down just a little bit as the year goes on, so l
23	wouldn't say an increase year over year, no.
24	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: But at least maybe meet that same
25	level

underway as well, and we've touched two of our restaurants and will continue to update our streetscape, restrooms, and restaurants as '24 goes into '25.

Crime statistics, as Keith pointed out, we saw an uptick for pent-up aggression and demand through '21 and '22. That has settled in '23, as you see on the screen, and we continue to see a downward trend in not only violations, but just crime and disturbances through '23 into '24 as well.

Also piggy-backing on Keith, this continues to be of utmost importance to the property and the company. As you can see, we've scanned nearly 175,000 IDs in 2023 year to date through September. It looks like we're on pace to get nearly 175,000 IDs scanned as well.

All of our security officers that are positioned at the podium, and we often double and triple up the podium to ensure no minors get through. We ID everyone that appears 30 years of age and younger.

We do spread the love in our charitable contributions and our community involvement. As you can see, the majority of this, as Keith mentioned, does come directly from our team members and groups and organizations that they enjoy partnering with. Our team members donated over 75,000 directly in '22 and '23 from our Boyd Giving Campaign, and the remaining balance of that fund came directly from Boyd.

Our economic impact and our tax contributions to

Missouri, not indifferent from Kansas City, is on par with what it's been in previous years. Nearly \$70 million was paid in '23, and to jump ahead and get ahead of your potential question, Chairwoman, I do believe that we'll meet and/or be relatively close to that number in '24 fiscal year. And over \$45 million in wages and total compensation has been paid.

A little fun fact, Missouri, our St. Louis market in Missouri is still ranked in the Top 10 of all U.S. gaming markets in the United States.

And we're proud to be a four-time winner and back as top work places in the State of Missouri from the *St. Louis*Post Dispatch. I believe we are seventh in large companies in the state, I'm proud of that accomplishment.

Our MBE/WBE spend, as you can see, in '21 we also had a very similar dip to what you saw in previous slides from the Kansas City property. That was in large part due to just the way in which we ran the business in '21 coming into and out of Covid as we did less promotional events in '21 and giveaways, and that's where a large portion of our MBE/WBE spend goes. But as you can see, we've continued to trend in the right direction, and we're now at a spend -- as a percent, a spend over what we were pre-Covid levels for MBE/WBE.

Any questions you guys have? If not, we do thank you for your consideration and our relationship.

4	business is Consideration of Joint Petition for Approval of
5	Transfer of Interest and Change of Control for Bally's
6	Corporation and Gaming and Leisure Properties, Inc.,
7	Resolution 24-058. General Counsel Heather Richenberger will
8	be making the presentation.
9	GENERAL COUNSEL RI CHENBERGER: Thank you. Good
10	morning, Chairman and Commissioners.
11	Under Tab K is a Petition for Transfer of Interest and
12	Change of Control filed jointly by Bally's Corporation and
13	Gaming and Leisure Properties, Inc.
14	Bally's Corporation is a holder of a Class A Gaming
15	License in Missouri and operates Bally's Kansas City Casino, a
16	Class B licensee. Gaming and Leisure Properties, also known
17	as GLPI, is a real estate investment trust, also known as a
18	REIT, and is the holder of a key business entity license in
19	the State of Missouri.
20	Pursuant to 11 CSR 45-10.040(12), this Commission must
21	approve any voluntary material change in ownership or control
22	of a gaming licensee. A material change of control includes
23	any sale, transfer, or lease by a licensee of all or any
24	portion of the real estate upon which a riverboat gaming
25	operation is conducted or located.

Bally's Corporation and GLPI are the Petitioners here, and they are seeking approval from the Commission for the sale and transfer of Bally's Corporation real estate assets upon which Bally's Kansas City Casino's Class B Riverboat Gaming Operation is conducted, including the riverboat, to GLPI.

This transfer results in GLPI owning the real estate on which Bally's Kansas City Casino operates its Class B
Riverboat Gaming Operation, resulting in a material change of control of the real estate assets of Bally's Corporation.

Immediately following this transfer, Bally's

Corporation will lease back the real estate, including the riverboat, from GLPI as a part of a master lease agreement.

Bally's Kansas City Casino will continue its casino operations on the same real estate via this leaseback agreement.

There will be no change in the operations or management of the Class B licensee, Bally's Kansas City Casino. There will be no change in the Class A ownership of Bally's Kansas City Casino with Bally's Corporation remaining the Class A licensee, and there will be no change in the key business entity license that's held by GLPI with the Missouri Gaming Commission.

The standard for Commission approval of a change in control is set forth in 11 CSR 45-10.040(12). That standard is that the transfer is in the best interest of the State of Missouri, the transfer is not injurious to the public health,

1	safety, morals, good order, or general welfare of the people
2	of the State of Missouri and would not discredit or tend to
3	discredit the gaming industry or the State of Missouri,
4	the transfer would have no material negative competitive
5	impact and would have no potential to affect the licensee's
6	suitability to hold a gaming license and it would not
7	potentially result in any significant negative changes in the
8	financial condition of any of the licensees.
9	If the change of control is approved by the Commission,
10	the Missouri Gaming Commission Staff is recommending two
11	conditions; first, that Bally's Corporation and GLPI deliver
12	copies of all documents executed in connection with this
13	transaction within seven days and, second, that the parties
14	shall report to the Missouri Gaming Commission any lease
15	amendments and any lease renewals.
16	I would be happy to answer any questions the Commission
17	may have on this matter.
18	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any questions for Ms.
19	Ri chenberger? Pat?
20	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: No, not really. I've always
21	tried to understand the advantages of GLPI, but that's
22	probably for a later discussion.
23	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Well, and it was much easier to
24	understand because Ms. Richenberger has explained the REITs to
25	us in the past, so we have a better understanding of the REITs

1	and how that works. And I don't have any questions either, so
2	thank you, Ms. Richenberger.
3	GENERAL COUNSEL RICHENBERGER: Thank you.

5	24-058. Is there a second?

19	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Our next item of business is
20	Consideration of Petition for Approval of Permanent
21	Relocation, Century Casino Caruthersville, Resolution 24-059.
22	I'd like to invite Century Casino GM Denny Callen to make the
23	presentation. I bet you thought this day would never come.
24	MR. CALLEN: Ms. Chairman and Commissioners, I also
25	brought Lyle Randolph. He's the vice President and General

Manager at the Cape Girardeau property and Vice President over the Caruthersville property, so I'll let him start with the presentation.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: All right.

MR. RANDOLPH: Good morning, Commissioners and Staff.

I'm Lyle Randolph, Vice President of Operations of Century

Casino here in Missouri.

I cannot express how honored and proud I am to be here making this request for approval today. It would be easy for someone just to look at the black and white resolution that is presented before you and not realize the impact of what that represents. For the community of Caruthersville, it represents opportunity. This is the same opportunity that I had back in 1995, 30 years ago.

I actually brought my original pay stub from when I was paid working the Surveillance Room grave shift and, again, that same opportunity that was presented to me and my family at that time, we're hoping that this development continues to do for the city.

The process really began five years ago in December of 2019 when this Commission, then led by Chairman Leara, approved Century Casinos to acquire the two properties at Cape Girardeau and Caruthersville. Just six weeks after Century took over, Denny had the unfortunate task to call corporate leadership and say that a barge had struck our gangway, and

they got a quick lesson in how life on the Mississippi is not all it's cracked up to be.

You can see river challenges. This is 2011, the high water, then the next year, low water where there's literally just a foot of water underneath the facility at that time.

Four days after that barge strike, Denny and I actually came up to meet with MGC Staff to really talk about how we could get the vessel off of the river and what options we had to make that process feasible.

Within a month, Century had gathered a group to try to make that happen. A couple of those folks are in the room today. We have Stephanie Bell with Ellinger Bell, Marc Ellinger and his team, James Harris on the legislative side that were here; and by late February of 2020, we were ready to begin the process and work with local legislators to get that process done.

And then Covid happened. Although we were delayed, we were not deterred. I wanted to point out this is me standing in -- this is the kind of issues we had, standing out here in the flood of 2011; again, just a challenging environment out on that river.

Although we were delayed, we were not deterred. By

December of 2020, our good friend down in New Madrid County

down in the bootheel had pre-filed bills for this non-floating

language, and then in the last week of session in 2021, a bill

passed that included the language, Governor Parson signed Senate Bill 26 in July of 2021.

We were here before the Commission December 1, '21, for tentative approval of the development of the non-floating casino, but just so we knew that things weren't that easy in Jefferson City, there was a challenge to that bill. Denny and I learned something called an omnibus bill and some of the challenges that come along with that, so we went back to the legislature again for a second time, second year in a row, and we were able to get Senate Bill 987, a stand-alone bill passed, and here's the Governor signing it again the next year on June 8, 2022.

As that project began, the operational challenges at Caruthersville really intensified. The water level dropped to a point that forced the original riverboat to close for the final time on October 13, 2022, and the river here in Caruthersville reached the all-time record of negative 1.82 feet, actually below the zero on the river gauge.

I don't think it can be overstated the impact that the Commission made, one of the most impactful decisions for the City of Caruthersville and the employees of Century Casino on October 26 of 2022, that's when this Commission granted approval to temporarily relocate the casino into the pavilion. And here you can see the pavilion. In the course of eight weeks, we were able to get off that riverboat and into the

pavilion, the ribbon cutting on December 16, 2022.

It's hard to imagine what that decision would have looked like had that not been made. The low water was terrible in '22, it was even worse in '23. It actually hit an all-time low again, and this time negative 2.98 feet, almost negative three feet.

It is certain that the casino would have had to close for a substantial amount of time, the real impact could have been even more detrimental; but instead, the temporary casino was opened in the pavilion, and despite having 100 fewer games than the prior barge and riverboat operations, the results were really amazing. We were located in the pavilion, which is only about what, 12,000 square feet of gaming space?

MR. CALLEN: Yes.

MR. RANDOLPH: But if you will go back and look at the state fiscal year ending in June of '24, guess which casino had the highest year-over-year percentage of all thirteen in the state? You guessed it, the Century Casino in Caruthersville.

While the overall results for the state were in decline of negative 2 percent, Caruthersville, with 100 less games but more conveniently located to our guests with parking, increased gaming revenue by 7 percent.

Kudos to Denny and his team for making that happen, and thank you to the Commission for making good common sense

decisions that are truly impactful. Inaction in the fall of 2022 would have certainly meant serious consequences, negative consequences, in 2023 to our team members and certainly to the City of Caruthersville. So thank you.

And while all this was happening, we happened to break ground on the new facility, and so in December at that same time, December of '22, we held our official groundbreaking.

And now Denny will tell you a little bit about the project that's moving forward.

MR. CALLEN: Good morning again. Thank you. After experiencing two historic droughts and then just operational challenges, it was exciting to get to the groundbreaking for this new casino. We also, to be able to build this, at the same time, we renovated an old hotel across the street from us where Century allowed us to buy that building and, instead of tearing it down, we invested a little over three million dollars in remodeling that facility to create the only hotel rooms in Caruthersville. The nearest ones would be five miles down the road in Hayti.

So with this rendering -- so right after our ground-breaking, we immediately started into our construction, so we used to have a large expo tent there that sat on that parking lot that would hold about 1,000 people, and that's where we had our event centers, our concerts; but we gave that up to be able to build this new facility and tie it into that pavilion

This here I wanted to show is the overview of where our tank room is, so you can see those four tanks at the bottom of the screen, those are four 1,000-gallon tanks, so we will have 4,000 gallons under that casino floor when we open next week.

And then you can see this is the final product of our tank room. That's what we call it. Again, those are agricultural 1,000-gallon tanks that you'll find out on the farm that we were able to secure and place down in that room before they covered it up. Two thousand gallons is the requirement under the law. We will have 4,000 gallons just so we know we're in compliance.

Just one of the phases of the construction where you can see the hotel rooms starting to take shape on top of that casino floor roof. And then one year ago, October 25 of last year is when we had our topping out ceremony.

So from that point to now, we've been doing lot of work to get this casino finished and up and running. And as we went through it, we've changed the landscape, the view of that property. As you come into Caruthersville, now you see that hotel rooms rising above that pavilion building with the iconic clock tower that we've kept on that pavilion building. That was originally designed to come out, and the city asked that it stayed, so it's there.

And then this is the final product. This is the view

from the other day of the finished product that you'll see as you enter that property now with that new hotel behind it and the new casino.

So this is the overall view, this is what the property will look like. You can see the concrete drive was recently poured. There's still a lot of work to get done there at the front with the landscaping, there's still a lot of work inside; but our team has been working diligently and hard and staying focused to hit these deadlines that we've established for them to hit.

We did close half of that temporary casino on the 14th of October, so we are actually operating right now with only about 200 slot machines and six table games, and that was to give the team the opportunity to move half of that casino floor over to the new floor so we can meet our timelines.

We will be closing, provided approval today is given, on October 28, next Monday, we will close the temporary casino and move the remaining equipment over.

This is a view of the river side of the back of that hotel. You can see we've only got three floors, but that top floor has balcony suites that are functional, and that is a view of the river. And I have another slide shortly.

This is just an inside view of the new casino. This is our patron walkway, our railing on a short pony wall. That's about a six-foot railing to maintain control of entry to that

casino floor so as you walk towards the restaurant or hotel check-in, you will not be able to just jump the railing or jump the wall and gain access, so we have control points there.

Our hotel rooms are finished and we're ready to go.

We had our hotel inspection from the state yesterday, and all we're waiting for now is our elevator inspection from the State Fire Marshal, then we'll have our hotel license, we'll be ready to go there.

This is the view from our balconies as you look out onto the Mississippi River at Caruthersville. You'll notice the two gazebos out there. Those were the actual access points to the old riverboat, and we felt it important as the history of that property that opened in 1995 to maintain those gazebos as river overlooks for our patrons.

We do have a 27-spot RV park just to the right of this photo that is not included that our RV patrons can also enjoy views of that river there in Caruthersville.

And then just a couple more pictures of the new casino floor. This is our table game area. You can see the slot machines being installed and put in on the bases, just some more photos there.

So the economic impact of this new construction will increase our employee count by about 30 to 35 positions. It's going to increase our payroll expense by about 1.4 million and

our estimated increase in tax revenue just in admission tax and gaming tax is 2.3 million, is what we're forecasting with this new property.

So for a rural community in a town of 6,000 people in a county of 18,000 people, this is a game changer for the property, for the gaming industry in the state and definitely for Caruthersville, Missouri. So we're very thankful for the Staff and all the assistance we've had in getting us to this point.

MR. RANDOLPH: And as Denny mentioned, we will have the grand opening, pending approval, on November 1. We've got a lot of work to do. Denny and I will be heading back quickly, and we will be working long hours for the next week with the rest of the team.

This project represents a \$51.9 million investment in Caruthersville, the largest private construction project in the history of the county. This project was funded by our real estate partners, another REIT, VICI, that's done -- that has been very good to work with, and it's part of an amendment to our master lease as well.

Denny and I respectfully request consideration of this

Petition for Approval of Permanent Relocation. Thank you.

Any questions that anyone has about the project?

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any questions for Mr. Callen or Mr. Randolph? Pat? I might have lost him.

10	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Well, I'd like to ride up on the
11	elevator since we walked up five floors last time. It almost
12	killed me.
13	I move to approve Resolution 24-059. Is there a
14	second?
15	MR. HANE: Second.
16	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any further discussion? Angie,
17	would you call the roll?

3	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Our next item of business is
4	Consideration of Disciplinary Action for PNK River City, LLC,
5	DC-24-086. Tom Venneman, Deputy General Counsel, will be
6	making the presentation.
7	MR. VENNEMAN: Thank you and good morning, Chairman and
8	Commi ssi oners.
9	Under Tab M we have a Preliminary Order of Discipline
10	directed at PNK River City, LLC, doing business as River City
11	Casino, for alleged violations of the casino's Internal
12	Control System, Chapter H, Section 3.08, now 3.09, and the
13	Commission's Minimum Internal Control Standards, known as the
14	MICS, Chapters E, Sections 604(B), U, Section 108, and S,
15	Sections 4.07 and 9.04.
16	In this matter, MGC Compliance Auditors conducted a
17	compliance audit on the casino for the period of March 1 of
18	2020 through October 31 of 2022. Audit Reports Numbers 23-03
19	and 23-04 were issued to the casino on February 7 of 2023,
20	documenting multiple findings.
21	In September and October of 2023, a follow-up was
22	conducted, and multiple repeat violations were found. MGC
23	Audit Report Number 23-03, Finding B-4 revealed that during a
24	cage window closing on August 23 of 2022, a transfer was not
25	verified before it was sent to the main bank in violation of

the casino's Internal Control System, Chapter H, Section 3.08, now 3.09. During the followup, auditors found that repeat violations occurred on September 28 and October 24 of 2023.

MG Audit Report Number 23-04, Finding A-4 revealed that meter reading comparison reports were not prepared for two electronic gaming devices, referred to as EGDs, with qualifying bill variances for three consecutive drop periods from July 13 through July 20 of 2022 in violation of the Commission's MICS, Chapter E, Section 604(B). During the follow-up, auditors found repeat violations on two different EGDs from June 14 through June 26 of 2023.

MGC Audit Report Number 23-04, Finding B-2 revealed that transaction detail reports of activity at each EGD were not maintained as source documentation used to investigate EGDs of non-cashable electronic promotion variances from July 26, 29, and 30 of 2022.

This is a violation of the Commission's MICS, Chapter U, Section 1.08. During the follow-up, auditors found repeat violations on July 11 and 12 of 2023.

MGC Audit Report Number 23-04, Finding E-1 revealed that River City could not provide standard IT checklists for ten different days in a review from April through May of 2022 in violation of the Commission's MICS, Chapter S, Section 4.07. During the follow-up, auditors found nine instances of missing checklists and 17 inaccuracies in the standard IT

checklists that were actually provided.

MGC Audit Report Number 23-04, Finding E-7 revealed that as of December 29 of 2022, a current list of all user accounts in the casino's accounting system, including the employee's name and the individual's corresponding user provisioning access, was not retained for at least one day of each month in violation of the Commission's MICS, Chapter S, Section 9.04. During the follow-up, auditors found that the same list was missing for the month of August in 2023.

The Disciplinary Review Board recommended a \$15,000 fine in these matters. In response to the proposed discipline, the casino does not contest the fine and has implemented procedures, provided team member training, and performed audits of the areas of concern to resolve repeat findings, and they report that they will continue to work diligently to prevent future occurrences.

I'll be happy to answer any questions the Commission may have at this time.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I understand, as you said, they've implemented some processes to avoid that. In the time since that time, do you feel like that those problems have been resolved?

MR. VENNEMAN: So we have had a couple of different communications from River City Casino. One of those was a letter detailing how they have addressed each one of those

1	violations. That came in August 27 of this year. We also
2	just recently had another follow-up that has updated even
3	further steps that they have taken and continue to monitor the
4	si tuati on.
5	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Okay. Any questions for
6	Mr. Venneman?
7	COMMISSIONER HANE: I just want to thank you and other
8	Staff members for answering some of my questions that I had
9	regarding some of these issues. And I was impressed with
10	River City's follow-up actions and hope they continue to try
11	and resolve these situations.
12	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Pat, anything?
13	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: No. I think it was a well-
14	prepared report, made it very understandable, and I feel like
15	I can go along with it.
16	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Absolutely. Thank you so much,
17	Pat. Thank you, Mr. Venneman, it was an excellent report.
18	MR. VENNEMAN: Thank you.
19	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I move to approve DC-24-086. Is
20	there a second?

19	waiver for their ownership in multiple Missouri licensees.
20	I'd be happy to answer any questions you may have.
